VICTORIAN TABLE TENNIS ASSOCIATION 32nd ANNUAL REPORT - 1961

Ladies and Gentlemen,

To record the 1961 year as the "Carrington Year" of Victorian Table Tennis would be most fitting as your Association benefitted greatly from the visit of Jack and Elsie Carrington. Their five months tour of Victoria was the highlight of 1961.

The performances of the Australian teams sent to the World Championships gained great credit for their country and your Association shares in this through the participation of leading Victorian Women players. During these through the participation at Table Tennis Federation granted the Australian Championships the International Table Tennis Federation granted the Australian Table Tennis Association an option to conduct the 1967 World Championships, with Melbourne as the venue.

The continued expansion of the Table Tennis Centre of Victoria added to the work performed by your Executive Committee in a very busy year for Table Tennis.

PENNANT COMPETITIONS

For the first time in many years, the entries for the Winter Pennant Competition recorded a drop in numbers. This decline of 10% on the 1960 figures caused some concern within the Committee and a full investigation was conducted into the reasons for the decline. Lack of interest amongst the older players accounted for the main drop in teams entered by the larger Clubs and this was only partly covered by the increase in the numbers using the Table Tennis Centre as their playing venue.

It is bleasing to report that the figures for the Summer Pennant Competitions recovered well and created an all time high for this competition. Again for the first time, the Summer figures equalled those of the Winter Competition and your Committee is convinced that this fillip of interest was a direct result of the publicity and promotion gained for the sport by the visit of Jack and Elsie Carrington.

Much thought and discussion has been put into the problem of late finishes to the pennant matches. Whilst this problem is not only a local one, your Committee feel that further thought must be given by the Clubs to see if a suitable solution can be obtained to stop matches finishing well after 11 p.m. The Pushing Play regulations have been amended by the I.T.T.F. but this seems to be only part of the problem and too many matches are finishing late in the night.

Another problem being tackled by your Committee is that of playing venues. The large increase in teams in the Summer Pennant was, in the main, accommodated at the Table Tennis Centre of Victoria. However, the maximum capacity was reached and some 20 teams had to be refused admittance to the Pennant because there were no tables available at the Centre.

This highlighted the position that fewer halls are being used for Table Tennis and the help of Clubs and Associations is required if we are to keep expanding in accordance with the population increase. Additional venues must be found, especially in the newer areas, and this problem and the planning for the future in this regard occupied many hours of your Committee's time.

A fixture book, including all Match Regulations, was distributed to all registered players of both the Pennant Competitions. Your Committee decided to advertise more of the Association's activities in the fixture books as it is recognized that it is the one publication that reaches the hands of the individual players.

Only minor amendments were made to Match Regulations at the Annual Meeting, mainly on points of clarification to existing Regulations. The Pennant competitions are being conducted without any great upsets between the teams and your Committee is satisfied that the existing Regulations are, generally speaking, satisfactory for good, friendly, competitive play.

It is with regret that a report must be made on the suspensions of players and the fining of a Pennant Club for a breach of Match Regulations. Following on a protest in a Grand Final of the 1960 Summer Pennant your Committee investigated the complaint that a player had played under an assumed name in E Grade when he was a registered C Grade player.

The charge was admitted by the Club, the officials of which were unaware that the breach had taken place. In February 1961 the Committee suspended the team captain for a period of six months, and the player for a period of seven months. The additional month was imposed on the player because he did not have the courtesy to attend the meeting called or apologise for his non-attendance.

As there was a doubt concerning the part played by the Club Secretary, your Committee ruled that he should not hold any official position in the Table Tennis Club concerned, and removed his name from the V.T.T.A. records as Secretary. The Club was fined the sum of £5.-.-. Your Committee has since received an apology from the Club concerned and they have assured us that, in future, every endeavour will be made to see that such an incident does not occur again. This Club has been represented in the Victorian Table Tennis Association since its inception in 1926, and this incident was the first blemish on what has been an excellent record of good sportsmanship over the years.

At the suggestion of one of our affiliated Clubs, the Committee has approved of listing the leading players in the various grades. These names have been recorded under their respective pennant competitions and will be of interest to all.

The statistics concerned for the various pennant competitions are listed and our congratulations are extended to the winners of the pennants.

The drop resulted in very uneven standards if a ten team grade competition was to be conducted, and it was decided to conduct a six team grade with two rounds. This resulted in a competition of one additional week but evening of the standards resulted in more interesting matches.

Leading women players were again granted permission to play in Mens A Reserve.

Following on a direction from the Annual Meeting a perpetual shield was obtained by the Association for the Mens A Grade, and this has been named the Angus Taylor Shield in honour of one of our Life Members and former Secretary of this Association.

NEWS SHEET

Grade

Over 30 News Sheets were distributed to all affiliated bodies on a weekly basis during the Pennant Competitions. All information relating to State, National and overseas Table Tennis was included in this weekly bulletin and your Committee feel that in spite of the high cost of this service, it is appreciated by all who receive it and should be continued in the future.

An appeal was made during the year for affiliated Associations to forward a copy of their News Sheets to our Honorary Secretary. This request is repeated and it is hoped that metropolitan and country publications will be forthcoming in the future.

DRESS

Progress in the standardisation of dress for Table Tennis players is a very slow process. Your Committee is confident that with the assistance of all affiliated bodies, the dress regulations can be enforced, to a greater improvement of the sport.

FINES

The Revenue Account shows a large amount of income through the payment of fines by Pennant Clubs for breaches of Match Regulations. As has been said before, this is one source of income your Committee could well do without and constant efforts were made to educate team captains and club secretaries of the increased administration caused by breaches of Match Regulations.

NEW CLUBS NIGHT

The usual New Clubs Nights and mornings were held one week prior to the commencement of the four pennant competitions, and these meetings were of great assistance to the players and officials who attended. During 1961, new secretaries were also invited to attend the meetings and received the same helpful advice and explanation given by the members of the Committee who were in attendance.

SUPPORT

After a disappointing entry in the Winter Pennant, your Committee were very pleased to record the increased support received for the Summer Pennant. All the pennant competitions conducted were very popular with all those who participated and your Executive Committee desire to thank all pennant clubs for their continued support.

The Annual Meeting of the Association is the main sounding board for the registered Clubs to express their opinions on the conduct of the sport by your Committee. All Clubs are requested to make sure that they are represented at the Annual Meetings of the Association and use their democratic rights to express their Clubs opinions.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

Four major championships were conducted by your Committee and all were successful. The Australian National Championships were conducted in Adelaide by the South Australian Association.

The usual interchange of players between the State Associations was again noted with pleasure by your Committee. It has long been the policy of your Association to encourage top players from the various States to meet in frequent competition and the standard of play throughout Australia has benefitted by this policy.

Your Committee wish to thank all players and officials who participated in interstate and local tournaments, and wish to record that it is only through the co-operation of all concerned that these Tournaments were so successful.

1. EASTER TOURNAMENT AND TRAMS COMPETITION

The 4th Annual Riversdale Easter Tournament created many records in that attendances of interstate players and supporters reached an all time high. The increased support came mainly from State Public Service Associations, who journeyed to Melbourne for the Easter Tournament. This was conducted just prior to the Australian Public Service National Championships also held at the Table Tennis Centre of Victoria.

Once again Riversdale Manufacturing Company joined with your Association in sponsoring the Tournament and Teams Competition and your Committee pays tribute to the excellent promotional work carried out by this Company in sponsoring the Annual Easter Tournaments.

Representatives from the various States were in attendance and the only leading players absent were the Australian Men and Womens teams competing in the World Championships at Peking.

Fourteen teams played in the various sections of the Men and Womens Teams Competition and some very interesting matches resulted. The first three in the main Mens Competition finished in the following order - Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland, with two wins each and only seven rubbers separating first and third teams.

3. VICTORIAN CLOSED

Your Association adds their thanks to the Tasmanian Table Tennis Association for a job well done.

7. NATIONAL

The 16th Annual Australian Championships were conducted in Adelaide from 4 to 8 September, 1961, and your Association was represented by a Men and Womens Team. In addition to the players a large number of officials and supporters travelled to Adelaide to witness the major Australian titles.

Tribute must be paid to our South Australian friends for the wonderful hospitality they extended to visitors from the various States.

It is regretted than an unfavourable report must be made in relation to the conduct of the actual Tournament. It was obvious from the start that insufficient tables were available for match play and this resulted in the time-table being completely disorganized and some very late finishes were recorded.

Your Committee regretted that events in the National Championships should be played until after 2 a.m. as it is unfair to the players concerned, the officials in charge and the supporters wishing to see the matches.

The South Australian Association had accepted the option to conduct the National Titles on the understanding that their new Table Tennis Centre would be available. Through circumstances beyond their control this Centre could not be commenced and other unsuitable arrangements had to be made.

Victoria continued to dominate the Womens Shilld even though two of our leading women players were overseas. The Mens Shield was won by the New South Wales team, defeating their traditional rival, Victoria, 6-5, in the deciding match, and we extend our congratulations to them on their success.

The Mens and Womens Singles titles were retained by Victorian players and the Womens Open Doubles and the Mixed Doubles were also captured by players from Victoria.

Victorian Table Tennis circles and our sincere congratulations are extended to him on receiving this award.

METROPOLITAN

This event was conducted during the evening of the three days following Cup Day and an increased number of entries was received. A very full program of 16 events was conducted and it is pleasing to report that the leading players supported this Tournament very well and the standard of play was high.

During this Tournament it was discovered that a player had been admitted to the D Grade Singles event in error. His previous performances and prior registration showed that he was of B Grade standard and even though the event had reached the Quarter-finals, the Tournament Committee disbanded the event

and refunded all entrants their entry fees. In order not to disappoint the players who had reached the semi-finals, a "knock-out" Competition was arranged for them and the winner and runner-up presented with a suitable trophy. The Committee upheld the Tournament Committee's decision as they felt it was unfair to the players of "D" Grade standard to allow this higher grade player in the event.

9. HANDICAP TOURNAMENTS

From March until December, a Handicap Tournament was conducted at the Table Tennis Centre, on the second Sunday of each month. During the year the numbers of entries regularly exceeded 80 and on two occasions over 100 entries were received. It is pleasing to record that junior players won some of these Tournaments.

10. RIVELLA SCHOOLCHILDREN'S TOURNAMENT

During 1961 Rivella (Aust.) Pty. Ltd., agreed to sponsor Schoolchildren's Tournaments to be conducted by your Association. These Tournaments are open to all junior players who do not play A Grade Junior Pennant, and were run during the school holiday period. The entries closed on the day of the Tournament and each player played at least three matches, and the ultimate winners were presented with suitable trophies. The events proved most popular with the junior ranks, and out thanks are extended to all those who helped make these tournaments so successful.

11. AFFILIATED ASSOCIATIONS

The following affiliated bodies received approval to conduct open championships and your Committee is grateful for the amount of time and energy given by the Committees concerned in running these events:

Benalla, Coburg, Dandenong, Geelong, Hamilton, Macedon, Murtoa, Shepparton, Stawell, Sunraysia, Traralgon, Warrnambool, Wonthaggi.

Both Metropolitan and Country events attracted a large entry from leading players and the improved standard seen in the organising of these events was very encouraging.

Members of the Executive Committee were able to attend some of the Open Championships held and the Executive wish to thank the visited Associations for the hospitality shown to them. It is the Associations policy to visit as many centres as is possible, allowing for the heavy demands already made on the free time of the Executive Committee.

Mrs. Suzi Javor and Victor Hirsch have again dominated the Table Tennis scene in Victoria, Both have imposing records during the 1961 Season and their rankings as Number 1 player is well justified. It is also pleasing to record that the average age of ranked players is dropping and this would indicate that the Victorian junior players have improved in standard over the years.

FRENCH AWARD

At the 1961 Annual Meeting the donor of this Award, Mr. Victor French, was called upon to present the 1960 Award to Robert Lim, the 1960 winner.

This Award is for the best player of the year in both sportsmanship and ability and in 1961 it was awarded to Mrs. Suzi Javor. Our congratulations are extended to Suzi for her win of this much coveted award in Table Tennis circles.

The record of Mrs. Javor's performances since her arrival in this country in 1957 is truly remarkable. In the four and a half years she has won 41 Singles Championships, 26 Womens Doubles Championships, 23 Mixed Doubles Championships, and out of 300 rubbers she has played in teams matches she has only lost one rubber.

Added to this brilliant record is a tribute to the wonderful co-operation that she has always shown and it is a fitting honour that she has received the 1961 French Award.

LINDY SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR

Again, Mrs. Suzi Javor gained great honour for herself and Table Tennis in Australia when she was chosen to be a recipient of one of the 20 Lindy's in presented to leading sportsmen and women of Australia.

This Award, commemorating the memory of Mr. Walter Lindrum, was awarded on the voting of the sportswriters and sporting commentators of Press, Radio, and Television throughout Australia. Mrs. Javor was one of the few women to receive the award, and the only Table Tennis player so honoured. Our congratulations are extended to her on this very appropriate Award for the true sportswoman that she is.

JUNIOR COACHING

A record was established in 1961 which augers well for the future. The record is associated with the amount of money spent on coaching of juniors. This amount for 1961 was approximately £300. Commencing in the Summer months and extending over 18 weeks on Saturday afternoons, squads of juniors were coached by the leading players. These juniors came from both metropolitan and country areas and greatly benefited by coaching received. Four juniors were given financial assistance to attend the National titles in Adelaide and a large contingent attended the Junior Championships in Hobart.

Out of this scheme it is pleasing to report that after only two years of competitive play some of these juniors are now A Grade players. Your Committee realises the importance of coaching in the junior ranks and have left no stone unturned in this direction during the year.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS 1961

These Championships were successfully conducted by the Table Tennis Association of the Chinese People's Republic at Peking in April 1961. Australia was represented by a Men and Women's team, the first occasion that a Women's team has been sent overseas.

The teams were:-

The Team Captain was Mr. K. Bowler of New South Wales. The Team Manager was our Victorian President, Mr. A. Cooper and the Australian President, Mr. R. Jones represented Australia at the meetings of the International Table Tennis Federation.

It is pleasing to report that whilst no major successes were recorded both teams performed very creditably with the women's results gaining the most prestige for Australia. The Women's team would have been ranked in the first ten in the World had they had one more team success and as some of their results were very cbse this nearly was achieved.

A short tour of South-East Asia was undertaken after the World Championships and this was enjoyed by all the tourists.

It was at Peking that Australia submitted an application for an option to conduct the World Championships in Melbourne and were allocated the 1967 titles. This great honour was the result of some excellent promotion by the Australian delegation at Peking and our congratulations are extended to all concerned.

Your Association had a short film made of the highlights of this Tour of the Australian teams and this was of great interest to all. This silent 16 m.m. film was made available to affiliated bodies for screening upon the return of the teams.

TABLE TENNIS CENTRE OF VICTORIA

IMPROVEMENTS

It is still the wish of your Committee that the Table Tennis Centre of Victoria be improved as finances permit. The enclosing of the Centre Court area and the completion of extensions to the Grandstand were the major works completed in 1961. The Committeeroom has been altered to make it more comfortable in view of its frequent use.

The increased size and public use of the Centre has necessitated additional cleaning and maintenance staff and this will now mean that the painting of the playing areas can be renewed at least annually and will add to the appearance of the Centre.

ALBERT PARK TRUST

This report would be incomplete if a tribute was not paid to Senator P.J. Kennelly and the Albert Park Committee of Management. Whilst no major negotiations were carried out in 1961 the continued co-operation from the Trust is an encouragement to your Committee.

During the year a Public Inquiry was held in relation to the Albert Park and your Association was called upon to give evidence. It is pleasing to report that the published results of the Inquiry reflect to the credit of the Albert Park Trust and with encourament of the use of the Albert Park by the public in competitive sport. The Table Tennis Centre was reported as filling a need of the public in providing facilities for the playing of sport. The fact that this venue in conjunction with Bosketball and Badminton is available to the public at night time was reported on favourably by the Inquiry as providing facilities for a greater period of time each day.

To have a Public Inquiry record that the Sporting Centres were well conducted and filling a public need is gratifying to the many honorary workers who have made these Centres possible.

SUPPORT

The large number of visitors in 1961 were again catered for by the 41 tables but this number of tables is not always sufficient to cope with the demand. There are few periods during the week when the tables are not fully occupied and this continuing support is very pleasing to your Executive Committee.

The encouragement of family groups and youth clubs has been one of our aims in 1961, and the large numbers of young people attending is encouraging. The Centre is still open for 96 hours each week to the public and there has been an increase in the use of the facilities during the lunch hours.

DUTYMEN AND STAFF

Mr. Paddy Hutchins continues to give sterling service to the sport of Table Tennis. Not content with fulfilling his duties as the Centre's Building Superintendent, Mr. Hutchins devotes many hours in promoting the sport in his own time. This is encouraging to your Committee and it is our sincere hope that we will obtain many years of service from this wonderful worker for Table Tennis.

The other staff employed at the Table Tennis Centre have been most loyal and we wish to thank them for their service to the sport.

Dutymen donating their time are still supplying service outside normal working hours at the Centre, and they have helped tremendously in keeping the Centre open for such lengthy periods. We are of the opinion that this is the best method of giving service and supplying a Centre where numerous Table Tennis queries can be answered.

MAJOR WORKS COMPLETED

Two additional courts floored with wood.

Walls panelled and fences erected on three additional courts.

Centre Court improvements including special lighting and amplification.

Clock advertisement adjacent to Centre Court.

Installation of mechanical cleaning equipment

Installation of steel lockers in mens dressing room.

THE FUTURE

At the 1961 World Championships the A.T.T.A. was granted an option to conduct the 1967 World Championships in Melbourne. The basis of the application for the option to conduct these titles showed the Table Tennis Centre as the venue.

In the granting of the option the International Body pointed out that the Centre in its present state was not entirely suitable for the conducting of such an important event. These remarks of course were not related to playing areas but rather to amenities, spectator accommodation etc. Your Committee have spent many hours examining the possibility of alterations to the Centre to bring it to the required standard. Such alterations, of course, must be with the co-operation of the Albert Park Trust and arrangements have been made for negotiations to commence at an early date.

AFFILIATED ASSOCIATIONS

Affiliations in the State of Victoria reached the record number of 69 during 1961. This strong support from Metropolitan and Country bodies continues to make the Victorian Association the strongest affiliation with the Australian Table Tennis Association.

There are 879 Clubs and 1610 Teams registered with Affiliated Associations in Victoria and each of these teams have assisted promotion of the sport by a new team affiliation fee. In order to assist the finances of the 1967 World Championships the A.T.T.A introduced a team affiliation fee of 3/-throughout Australia. One half of this fee is credited to a World Championships Trust Account. Your Committee desires to thank the Affiliated Associations for their help in collecting this new fee during 1961.

The Centre was opened by the Mayor of West Geelong, Cr. H.C. Moore, on Thursday, 8th August and various members of your Committee attended the opening. The Geelong Executive Committee are to be congratulated on the excellent centre that they have provided for the public of Geelong and it is pleasing to record that they are receiving tremendous support in their new venture.

UMPIRES' LEAGUE

continued support was given by the League during 1961. Pennant matches each week and all major Tournaments saw many members of the League in action and their sterling work has already assisted your Committee in the conduct of the sport in accordance with the laws of Table Tennis.

From the lead given by the Victorian Umpires League, other State Associations have sponsored similar Leagues, and it is hoped that the future will see a big increase in the numbers of competent umpires for Table Tennis.

The 1967 World Championships mean increasing responsibilities for all Umpires Leagues throughout Australia and a call is made to all affiliated bodies to give publicity to this aspect of Table Tennis with the view to increasing the number of umpires available.

The membership of the Victorian League is now 22, of which there are 14 State Umpires and 3 National Umpires.

SPECIAL EVENTS

1. MOOMBA

The usual respresentation of Table Tennis was seen during the 1961 Moomba festivities. The International Tournament for the Skolnik World Cup was conducted at the Table Tennis Centre and we congratulate the winners, Latvia, on their fine win.

The Lord Mayor's Trophy was again contested by individual singles competition and the 1961 winner of this trophy was V. Hirsch.

These two events are now a permanent part of the Table Tennis Calendar and are well supported by the leading players. Your Committees thanks are due to all those who participated and organised these events for the further promotion of Table Tennis.

2. AUSTRALIA V VICTORIA TELEVISION MATCH

At the request of the Australian Broadcasting Commission, your Association organised a direct telecast from the Table Tennis Centre of Victoria on Wednesday 7th June, 1961. In order to provide first class standard of play your Committee asked the Australian selectors to pick a team to represent Australia and to play against a team representing Victoria.

Murray Thomson (South Australia) and Cliff McDonald (New South Wales) recently returned from the Peking World Championships, were joined by Victor Hirsch and played for Australia. Robert Lim, Victor Sirvic and John Marton represented Victoria and some very interesting matches resulted.

The overall decision was a 9/2 win by Australia but 5 of these matches went to the third game and kept the large crowd in attendance interested throughout the evening.

Mr. Jack Carrington of England joined the A.B.C. commentators in providing an excellent commentary of the telecast.

3. NEW SOUTH WALES COUNTRY TOURS

In conjunction with the N.S.W.T.T.A. two tours by country players from both States were again organised.

A mens team from New South Wales visited Victorian country centres and were well received wherever they played. A Victorian ladies team visited New South Wales country centres and again a most enjoyable tour resulted.

These tours have proved in the past that Country players appreciate the opportunity of participating against their opponents in other States. Endeavours have been made to interest the South Australian Table Tennis Association, but as yet these negotiations have not been finalised.

The results of the main matches in the 1961 Tours were as follows:-

The New South Wales Men defeated Victoria Men 6/1, Victoria being represented by W. Hawley and L. Elliott of Traralgon and J. Lyons of Geelong.

The Victorian Women's Team, Mrs. N. Kneebone, Mrs. P. Curtis and Miss J. Teague of Shepparton, with Miss B. Hunter of Geelong defeated the New South Wales Country team 6/5.

MACCABIAH GAMES

Of the 14 Australian Jewish sportsmen and women selected to represent Australia at these games in Israel, four leading Victorian Table Tennis players were included The players selected were Mrs. S. Javor and Miss L. Cohen, Mr. T. Kurtak and Mr.B Peters. Barney Peters had the additional honour of being Australia's standard bearer in the march past.

The Women's team is to be congratulated on winning the gold medal for the Teams Competition. A second gold medal was won by S. Javor and L. Cohen when they were successful in the Womens Doubles Championship. Mrs. Javor recorded another great win in defeating Mrs. I. Roseam, five times World Champion 2/0 in the teams competition and was runner-up to the same player in the Womens Singles Championship.

5. EXHIBITIONS

To promote Table Tennis and provide interesting entertainment your Committee called on many leading players to give exhibitions during 1961. The Selection Committee wish to thank all those who participated in this wonderful service to the sport. With increasing population, it naturally follows that more people can be introduced to the sport and it is only suitable exhibitions properly managed and presented that the promotion of Table Tennis can be carried to more and more areas.

Then it is realised that exhibitions were played in schools, business houses, country centres, scout and church halls, it is a great credit to our leading players that they provided such a high standard of entertainment and instruction Throughout the years Victorian Table Tennis has received its main impetus from staging exhibitions and thus stimulating the interest of the spectators, and your Committee desire to place on record their sincere appreciation for the large part that was undertaken by the leading players. Your Committee intends to continue its policy of providing exhibitions wherever possible in the future.

PROMOTION OFFICER-COACH

The long awaited Carrington Tour took place during 1961. Jack and Elsie Carrington were welcomed by your Committee on April 23rd and it was a sad night when we farewelled them on their ship on September 20th.

Mr. Carrington's reputation as Director of Coaching to England and several other countries was already known to us; it was a delightful discovery to find his charming wife so accomplished in the arts of coaching and promotion too.

In the course of a hectic and varied five months tour of duty with the Victorian Table Tennis Association, the Carringtons activities included:

When we observe that the above program provided coaching for some 800 players (mostly voungsters) and specialised instruction for 80 student coaches not to mention the hundreds of youngsters who had the opportunity to watch and the many officials who were able to exchange ideas with our experts, the wide impact of the "Carrington Visit" will be realised.

Your Committee wish to record their sincere appreciation of the devotion to duty shown by the Carringtons. Any call that was made on them, even during their supposedly "free" time, was gladly met, and working with such charming people has been an inspiration to your Committee.

A.T.T.A.

Victorians continue to be well represented in Australian Table Tennis Association office-bearers. At the 1961 Annual Meeting Mr. R. Jones was re-elected Australian President and Mr. R. Carlile re-elected Australian Secretary. A new position of Australian Treasurer was created and Mr. K. Bowler of New South Wales was appointed to it. Mr. T. Horsfield of Victoria was appointed as Secretary of the A.T.T.A. Umpires Sub-committee at the Annual Meeting.

Our congratulations are extended to these hard-working gentlemen for their efforts for Australian Table Tennis.

VICTORIAN HONOUR ROLL

It is the desire of your Committee to install at the Table Tennis Centre suitable Honour Roll of Victorian title-holders and office-bearers. Much detail was prepared during 1961 with the help and co-operation of former players. It is expected to erect the Honour Board over the foyer of the Table Tennis Centre during 1962.

The Association's records are complete from the year 1930 when the Victorian Table Tennis Association was commenced. From 1925 to 1929 the Association was known as the Melbourne Table Tennis Association and it is for this period that we have very few records available. If any of our affiliated Clubs can assist by supplying details of Victorian Open Championship winners or the office-bearers during these early years, your Committee would be very grateful.

PROPOSED CHANGE OF ADMINISTRATION

The management of the sport throughout Victoria is the main object of your Committee but of recent years a large amount of time is required to administer the business venture of the Table Tennis Centre of Victoria. Your Committee is at present investigating a more suitable method of dividing the responsibilities of these two sections of their duties so that a more equitable distribution of the work can be made.

Although Executive meetings were held twice a month, with many supporting Sub-committee meetings throughout the month, it was found during 1961 that your Committee could not cope with the very heavy agendas prepared. Full investigation was made into other major sports in relation to their administration. From the experience gained in this survey and some very full discussion of your Executive Committee, a proposal is to be made during 1962 for the possible establishment of permanent open Table Tennis Clubs.

LIFE MEMBER

Through an oversight in the 1959 Annual Report no mention was made of the Life Membership conferred on our President, Mr. Albert Cooper, and our apologies are extended to Mr. Cooper for this oversight.

At the 1959 Annual Meeting by a unanimous vote the Meeting made the 7th Life Membership of the Association. This honour can only be given every three years and Mr. Cooper joins a very select band of Table Tennis Life Members.

Alby Cooper became interested in the sport in 1932 when he was connected with the South St. Kilda Table Tennis Club. This Club later joined with the St. Kilda Cricket Club and Alby held the position of Chairman of the Table Tennis section from 1938 to 1958. His resignation in 1958 was brought about by his acceptance of the Presidency of the V.T.T.A.

He joined the V.T.T.A. Executive Committee in 1940 and in 1946 was made a Vice-President. Since 1952 he has been a Vice-President of the St. Kilda Cricket Club. The congratulations of your Association were extended to Mr. Cooper during the 1959 Annual Meeting by the members present.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

As listed in the front of this report there are many Sub-committees elected each year and there is much over-lapping of personel comprising these Sub-committees.

In an era of rising costs, it is with pleasure that your Committee reportthat no increase in fees has been made for many years. This has only been possible by strengthening the General Revenue Account of the Association with some of the surplus from the Table Tennis Centre.

NEW CENTRES DEVELOPMENT FUND

It will be observed in the Financial Accounts that a reserve under this heading has been made. Your Committee is conscious that it is necessary to assist the promotion of other Centres throughout the State of Victoria.

Finance is always a very essential part of any new plan and in the establishment of this reserve the Committee hopes that financial assistance can be given in the future.

THANKS

To the Press, Radio and Television staff, our sincere appreciation is recorded. Publicity is a vital part of the promotion of any sport, and the help received by your Committee during 1961 was greatly appreciated.

There are many people, the "backroom boys" who assist in the promotion of the sport but do not necessarily serve on any Table Tennis Committee. Your Association pays tribute to the excellent work that is done by these supporters of the sport and wish to acknowledge the help that has been received.

ADDENDUM

I wish to place on record my thanks to all members of the Executive Committee for another years work well done. As always the bulk of the work falls on two officers, namely the Honorary Secretary and the Honorary Treasurer.

Mr. Max Rundle, our Honorary Secretary has attended the affairs of this Association in a capable and efficient manner.

His Assistant, Mr. A. Walker has faithfully recorded all matters referring to pennant matches.

Mr. Len Haycraft has again handled the financial entries in a most capable manner and is undoubtedly one of our most experienced officials.

Following the resignation of Mr. Gary Forbes as Honorary Assistant Treasurer, the Vice President, Mr. E. Leder, an accountant by profession, acted as the Honorary Assistant Treasurer, and carried out his duties in a most satisfactory way.
